# 1. About the eSeries

The electronic series *Studies in Variation, Contacts and Change in English* (ISSN: 1797-4453) is an academic series published by the Research Unit for Variation, Contacts and Change in English (VARIENG). Thank you for your interest in submitting an article to an upcoming volume of the publication. The following instructions are meant to help you meet our technical requirements for submissions. Additional information is available from the web editor and the managing editor of the series (<u>http://www.helsinki.fi/varieng/journal/staff.html</u>) and from the editors of individual volumes.

# 2. Possibilities offered by the digital medium

The VARIENG eSeries is intended to explore the possibilities afforded by the digital medium to academic publishing. At its best, digital publishing allows greater freedom in evidence-based scholarship, with more and more of the primary data being made available to the research community as part of an article. You are therefore encouraged to consider new approaches to the presentation of research data and connections between concepts and theories. Some examples of multimedia content and research data that can be easily included in online articles are hyperlinks, tables, images, audio and video files, corpora, databases, flash animations, and software demos.

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Articles can be submitted in any normal text document format (.doc, .rtf, .odt, etc.) or in HTML. You may include images in the document to show their placement and captions, but please also send all images as separate attachments in the highest possible resolution. Please contact the web editor if you would like to submit in HTML. Authors are expected to obtain permission to use copyrighted material.

Each article must have an abstract of 200–300 words. We will provide a link to your personal web page and to that of your academic affiliation (university and department), so please include the web addresses for these. Special characters in the article (including mathematical equations) are not a problem to represent on the web; in any case you will be presented with electronic proofs to check before publication. Please also be aware that you do not need to worry about margins, indents, or other formatting issues, as the conversion to HTML will condition these aspects, but please number sections and subsections.

We would like to emphasize once again how well online publishing lends itself to presenting your research and arguments in new and interactive ways. If it can be produced on your computer, it can be reproduced on the web.

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Our policy is to avoid linking to outside sources directly from the main body of text. Instead, hyperlinks to web sources are collected under a Sources subheading and references to online articles and other publications under References.

References should be listed first alphabetically and then chronologically. For each author, all individually written titles are listed before jointly written ones. Authors' names should be given in the way the authors do themselves, i.e., with full first name(s) and/or initials. For the first author, first names and/or initials follow the surname (after a comma). In case of an edited volume, add 'ed.' or 'eds'. Journal titles should be given in full. Please make sure all articles are listed with a page range. In publishers' names, please omit additions such as Publishing Company, Ltd., etc. Below are some examples of commonly referenced types of works. Where possible, we encourage the use of the DOI System, see <a href="http://www.doi.org/">http://www.doi.org/</a>. For early works, please use the short title and link to ESTC (<a href="http://estc.bl.uk/">http://estc.bl.uk/</a>). You can also contact our web editor for ways to
